I am pleased to report that the School's financial outlook is still on plan despite rising costs and economic uncertainty. As always, we thank Mrs Little and Mrs Anderton for continuing to closely monitor the School's finances to not only ensure that the School remains in a surplus budget position for the year, but at the same time, ensuring sufficient learning resources for the children.

With special thanks to the STMSA; like the governing body are all volunteers and have worked tirelessly organising events and activities that raise extra funds for the school which in turn helps to enhance the school environment and improve learning. So, to each and every one of you, "Thank you". The STMSA have raised c. £9,600 in the 21/22 financial year (1 Sept 21 - 31 Aug 22)! STMSA donated c. £7,000 to the school in the 21/22 FY and has given a further c. £7,000 during the current FY to date.


Items funded include:

The Importance of Being Simply Happy - Monica Murray

Every year, around this time, it is a tradition in our house to read the world-famous novella, "A Christmas Carol", written by Charles Dickens and published in Christmas 1843. The story of the miserly Ebenezer Scrooge, and his transformation following visits from the three ghosts at Christmas Eve, is an allegory of a rebirth: a man who rejects family and friends, bitter for what life has given or not given him, it ends with him finding happiness and contentment by embracing all of the values of Christmas such as family and love which he neglected during his sad and empty life.

The story demonstrates how it is possible to live in a spontaneous, simple and less structured way. All of this, of course, runs contrary to what we all do in our modern, hectic world. An example of this is the relentless competition driven by parents and foisted on young adults, and children. We all push our kids to get the best score, to win at football or netball, to do everything to the highest level. We invest in building their capabilities almost to the point of opening a second mortgage! We are compelled to seek a quantitative value to score every single dimension of our happiness. We need to have more than to be, to achieve the best more than to try to be the best we can.

But our children are paying a price for this. True, they might love the everyday activities, after school clubs etc that they do; nevertheless, they are immersed - in fact, submerged since an early age, in a world of expectations and rush, in a world of constant confrontation, of emulation, of ascendancy. This can often result in a deep anxiety which can have an impact in their adult life.

If, as Albert Einstein said, "Creativity is the residue of wasted time" it seems that these generations have not much left; this is not only worrying but also sad. Children should be children as long as they can. It is not too late to embrace this concept. In fact, it is never too late.

It takes Scrooge to arrive at almost the end of his life before he understands what really counts: doing the right thing for a little boy who sings a Christmas carol on his doorstep, being with family or friends, forgiving and sometimes forgetting, facing the pain that life sometimes throws our way with resolve and no little humour. Scrooge's wealth and position did not take him very far in terms of happiness and inner peace. Because what is life about? It is about love and friendship, about faith, about being honest with ourself and in peace with the others, about respect, imagination and hope; of course hard work and doing the best we can are important but not to the extent that we miss the bigger picture.

The road we follow as Catholics and Christians is based on human values like inclusion and kindness in our everyday life rather than ambition or acquisition. It is not essential to be perfect. Instead we should seek inspiration from that little child who is always within us hidden deep inside, the better angel of our nature (yes, I stole that from Abraham Lincoln!).

For, as Dickens says, "no one is useless in this world" and "it is good to be children sometimes and never better than at Christmas".
