

scripture

Luke 11:1-11

One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples." He said to them, "When you pray, say: 'Father, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, for we also forgive everyone who sins against us. And lead us not into temptation.""

Then he said to them, "Suppose one of you has a friend, and he goes to him at midnight and says, 'Friend, lend me three loaves of bread, because a friend of mine on a journey has come to me, and I have nothing to set before him.' Then the one inside answers, 'Don't bother me. The door is already locked, and my children are with me in bed. I can't get up and give you anything.' I tell you, though he will not get up and give him the bread because he is his friend, yet because of the man's boldness he will get up and give him as much as he needs.

"So I say to you: ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened. Which of you fathers, if your son asks for a fish, will give him a snake instead?"

Reflect

Where does real, true, authentic prayer start? Is it a technique that we can learn the right skills for, just hard work that we need to persevere at, or reserved for just a holy few who have some innate gift for it?

In Luke we are reminded where prayer really starts. "One day Jesus was praying." Real, true, authentic, prayer starts with Jesus. Prayer doesn't start with what we think of God, special techniques, hard work or holy huddles. It also doesn't begin with our desires and efforts. It starts with Jesus and he calls us to talk to God as our Father. Jesus is the God who came down not just to teach us how to pray, but to allow us to enter into the conversation that's been happening for all eternity.

The living God is a Father forever loving his Son in the unity of his Spirit. It shows that God is a God of relationship, a God of conversation, a God of prayer.

Jesus has been praying for all eternity, but now he invites his followers to enter into that conversation. To talk to his Father as our father.


Why not join the conversation today as Pope Francis asks us?
