Sports Premium Update - Kate Addison

Approximately 25% of a child's time at primary school is break times, which is why we have chosen to commit a large proportion of our Sports Premium expenditure on making break times as inclusive, active and fun as possible. Our aim is for all children to be able to access high-quality play every day! In September, we began our journey with Outdoor Play and Learning (OPAL). OPAL provides us with a mentor to help us ensure that break times are the best they could possibly be, whilst encouraging children to be active for at least an hour each day, in line with Government guidance.

Whilst active play is our main focus for the near future, we are pleased to be able to continue our partnership with Dacorum School Sports Network (DSSN), who organise the different events, tournaments and leagues that we are entered in to across the Dacorum area. So far this year children have attended: Glow Dance, Multi-Sport, Athletics, Cross Country, Football matches and Netball matches with many more events lined up for the Summer term!

EUREKA! - Monica Murray

"The monotony and solitude of a quiet life stimulate a creative mind." This is a quote from Albert Einstein, who would be frankly horrified and shocked from the life style we have nowaday, especially where we live. Running, rushing, constantly stressed and anxious to be on time here and there, since such an early age. Is this really that good?

Creativity starts with spending time alone, with yourself: in these moments of silence those "Eureka!" (from the ancient Greek: "I got it!") arise. Moments where we get to "feel" and know ourself better. The lives of our children, mine in first instance, are often packed with structured activities from dawn till dusk. Piano lessons, football, drama, coding and all sort of classes: the modern child's schedule is often meticulously organised, leaving little room for unstructured play and imagination. However, there is a growing recognition among educators and parents alike of the importance of giving primary school children especially, the space to develop their imaginations rather than filling their days and weeks (with months well planned in advance!) with a massive amount of organised activities and social schedule.

Free time is crucial for kids; it provides the unique opportunity to explore, create and innovate. Even daydreaming (something my oldest - and my husband - are the best at) is essential, magical and unrepeatable; a unique treasure just there, at our arch, to project towards a mysterious and wild world of our own, as Willy Wonka, the king of imagination, would certainly say. Unstructured play promotes physical health and well-being, develops independency, self esteem and resilience. If it happens outdoor it also promotes connection with nature especially in this age, where screen time is on the rise. Of course, structured activities certainly should have their place, but should not overshadow the importance of free play and exploration.

By prioritising unstructured time, parents and educators can help nurture the creativity, social skills, and resilience of the next generation, laying the foundation for a brighter and more innovative future. "There is no life I know I can compare with pure imagination" says Willy Wonka, a solitary but imaginative, "mad", wild, individual, who creates a world of colours, flavours, smells and magic. From being a pure orphan, left on his own, and not to forget, he becomes a millionaire! This is extreme, but the concept is there. And, to use the lovely old Willy 's words again, it is clear: "We are the music makers and we are the dreamers of dreams".
